<b>Parenting</b> Help all families establish home environments to support children as students	<ul> <li>Parents learn the importance of modeling their literacy experiences at home</li> <li>Parents appreciate the value of spending time reading and talking with their children</li> </ul>
<i>Volunteering</i> Recruit and organize parent help and support	<ul> <li>Parents participate in school activities to recruit other parents to participate</li> </ul>
<i>Learning at Home</i> Provide information and ideas to families about how to help students at home	<ul> <li>Parents model the love of reading</li> <li>Parents receive books for themselves and for their children, building their family library</li> <li>Parents learn strategies for discussing reading with children</li> </ul>
<b>Collaborating with the Community</b> Identify and integrate resources and services from the community	<ul> <li>Authors from the community speak with the book club</li> <li>Relationship is established with local book store or library</li> <li>Meetings are held in schools, library, or other community locations</li> </ul>
